The past month has been extremely rainy but now that the warmer weather is on the way activities are starting around Country Village.

HOMEOWNERS HO3 POLICY INSURANCE

We need to remind everyone that many still are underinsured for their homeowners' policies. Each home should be insured for no less than \$300,000. **It would be good to have a policy for \$350,000 as the homes here on average sell for \$460,000. You need a \$1,000,000 liability coverage along with listing Country Village Estates, 250 Theodore Drive, Coram, NY 11727 as an interested party.**

Remember we are not condos; we are townhomes, and these policies should be an HO3 policy.

POOL NEWS

Many homeowners complained about the roughness of the bottom of the pool for the past few years. We had a few estimates obtained to have the pool floor smoothed out and the coping changed. The deep grey coping everyone found to be too hot to the touch, so that will be changed as well.

I'm sure everyone has seen that the new pool furniture has arrived. Once the repairs are completed along with the new matching pool furniture, that area will certainly be a place to enjoy during the summer months. We are planning to open the pool by Memorial Day weekend. As you were made aware, we have a new keypad entry to get inside the clubhouse from either of the pool doors. The code number is 0250#.

The back door by the bathroom has the normal push bar to get out to the pool area. To access the pool from the double glass doors, next to the billiard room, you must press the lighted release button on the wall to the left and the push bar at the same time, and this will give you access to the pool.

DYMOND INDUSTRIES AND THE NEW HOMES

We have been in touch with Kevin Dymond who stated the hold-up with finalizing the startup of building the homes is due to a NEW fire marshal for Suffolk County who is making other suggestions. These suggestions need other diagrams to be made. Kevin does feel that as soon as his request is rectified, the building of the homes should start. Once we know, you will all be made aware of it.

ELECTRICAL BOXES

We have observed over the past few years that we have 5 deteriorating electrical boxes that need to be replaced. These boxes calculate the electricity we use for Country Village not for your individual use. These will be changed within the next couple of weeks.

VALVE REPLACEMENTS

We are continuing with the last of our valve replacements this year. Each home has a valve for their water supply. They should be checking every 3 yrs to make sure they are functioning. Ours wasn't checked for 25 yrs so we are indeed fortunate that nothing has happened. When this project is completed, we will be moving on to plan other projects to keep Country Village age and functioning without a problem. Of course, we will be informing every one of the next new project.

LANDSCAPING

Just a reminder that our landscapers, Perfect Lawn Care, care for lawns and shrubs on common ground. Anything within your patio is your responsibility. 


SHANAGEGANS SOCIAL EVENTS



DIRE WOLVES!?

Dire wolves? Back from extinction? This news wasn't on our 2025 bingo card.

But what are the real facts surrounding this huge news story? Let's break it down a bit.

Colossal Biosciences, a Dallas, Tex.-based biotechnology company announced on Monday that they had brought back the dire wolf from extinction with the birth of 3 dire wolf pups (Romulus, Remus, 5 months old, and Khaleesi, 2 months old). This is a bold announcement since these animals are essentially a genetically modified gray wolf. The scientists working on the project used a "morphological species concept," meaning that species are grouped by physical characteristics. Basically, the team's goal was not to create a dire wolf that shared 100% of the genes with its ancient ancestors, just an animal that looked similar to what we *think* a dire wolf might've looked like.

Jacquelyn Gill, a paleoecologist at the University of Maine made a comment in an article published by Scientific American stating, "'The pups don't have any traits that would allow us to understand the dire wolf any better than we did yesterday,' Gill says, adding that understanding ice age organisms isn't just a matter of knowing what they looked like or what they ate—but also about knowing what they did in those ancient ecosystems. 'Some of those things are coded genetically; some of those are cultural' and passed down from generation to generation."

To sum it all up? These animals are a romantic thought, especially for Game of Thrones fans, but they are not 100% dire wolves brought back from extinction. They are gray wolves with modified genes, some of those genes come from dire wolf variants.

Our overall hope is that the company's goal of using this technology to help our world's biodiversity crisis and aid conservation efforts with animals such as the red wolf will be seen in the upcoming years.

While we think that the technology surrounding this work is impressive, we also can't help but wish that the funding, science and media attention used to "bring back" a species from extinction could be used to protect the already existing gray wolves in our country that are being ruthlessly targeted in anti-wolf legislation as we speak.

How were they genetically engineered?

Colossal scientists extracted ancient DNA from two dire wolf fossils: a tooth from Sheridan Pit, Ohio, about 13,000 years old, and an inner-ear bone from American Falls, Idaho, roughly 72,000 years old.

Twenty genes of gray wolves were edited with this DNA to include dire wolf traits in gray wolf cells. Through cloning, embryos were created from the edited gray wolf cells, and these were implanted in surrogate domesticated dog mothers. A pharmacist's guide to drug safety

As a pharmacist-health services researcher, Dr. Antoinette Coe studies how to improve medication use and safety. Some of her motivation comes from personal experiences as a caregiver and helping family members keep track of their medications — which can get complicated.

Research suggests that half of medications prescribed for people with chronic diseases might not be taken correctly.

Coe, an assistant professor of clinical pharmacy at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, answered questions about how to prevent errors for an American Heart Association News series that asks specialists to explain how they apply what they've learned to their own lives. Her remarks have been edited.

What are some of the most frequent errors people make with their medications?

Some common problems people make are related to how they take their medication, such as forgetting to take it or not taking it at the right time; taking too much or too little; and taking medications that can interact with each other, including over-the-counter medications, herbal products and supplements.

How can medication problems arise?

Communication plays a large role. For instance, when a health care professional counsels the patient on how to take their new medication in a way that is not clear, the patient may not understand the directions.

What are the concerns for older people?

Older adults are at higher risk for medication problems. They may have multiple chronic conditions, which can lead to complex medication regimens, leading to an increased risk for drug interactions or challenges with medication adherence.

Also, older adults may have changes in liver or kidney function, which can affect how the body metabolizes and clears the medications from the body.

Vision or hearing impairments may lead to problems reading prescription labels or hearing instructions.

Arthritis may make it hard to open bottles. Cognitive decline may make it harder for older adults to remember how or when to take their medications.

Medication costs may also be a large problem.

Are heart medications a particular concern?

Heart medications can be a source of medication-related problems, especially since cardiovascular conditions are so prevalent, particularly among older adults who are on multiple medications. The medications may have side effects such as dizziness or fatigue or need dosage adjustments requiring monitoring and communication with their health care team.

What sorts of questions should people ask about their medications, and whom should they ask?

A patient should understand what each medication treats and how and when to take it, including whether to take it with food.

Some questions to consider for their doctor:

- What is this medication being prescribed for?
- What are potential side effects, and what should I do if they occur?
- How long do I need to take this medication?
- Is there anything I should avoid while taking this drug, such as food?

For their pharmacist, they can ask:

- How should I take this medication?
- Does this medication interact with any of my other medications?
- Are there any side effects I should be concerned about?
- What should I do if I miss a dose?
- Where should I store this medication — in the refrigerator or at room temperature?

What should people and their caregivers do to avoid medication errors?

One of the most important things is for people to have an accurate and up-to-date list of all medications they take, including prescription medications, over-the-counter medicines, herbal medications and supplements, and share it with their health care team.

Another helpful thing is to fill all their medications at one pharmacy, if possible, so the pharmacist knows their medications and can check for drug interactions or duplications.

People should ask their pharmacist, doctor or other health care team member if any medication instructions are not clear.

Storing medications properly and keeping them out of reach of children is also important.

What advice do you give to friends or family when asked to help sort out medication problems?

My advice is to make sure they have a list of all of their medications, dosages, how to take them, why they are taking them, and who prescribed their medication. They should keep that list with them, such as in their wallet, to bring to all of their medical appointments.

And if they are having any issues with remembering to take their medications as prescribed, I suggest they consider using a medication pill box, a reminder alarm or an app on their phone.
