March Is the Third Month of the Year

March is the first month of spring in the northern half of the world. It is named after Mars, the Roman god of war.

March is the third month in the Gregorian calendar and has 31 days. In the northern half of the world, March is the beginning of spring. In the southern half, it is the beginning of fall.

The Month of War

The meaning of March comes from ancient Rome: In Latin, it was called martius mensis or the month of Mars, the Roman god of war. March was the first month in the early Roman calendar because war would start again after the winter.

Important Dates in March

March 10: Daylight Saving Time (DST) starts in most areas in the USA and Canada by springing the clocks forward one hour. In Europe, clocks go one hour forward to “summertime” in the early hours of March 26. Most other countries that follow DST change their clocks on March 26.

March 17: St. Patrick’s Day. What started as a day in honor of Ireland’s patron saint has become an international celebration. People in many countries like to drink, be merry, and wear green on this day.

Astronomical Events in March

Worm Moon: The Full Moon in March is traditionally called the Worm Moon, because earthworms tend to appear around this time in many locations in the northern half of the world.

March Equinox: The spring equinox is the first day of astronomical spring in the northern half of the world—and the start of fall in the southern half. The spring equinox is on March 19, 20, or 21, depending on the Moon.

March Was the First Month

March used to be the first month of the year in the early Roman calendar. Around the year 700 BCE, the Roman king Numa Pompilius introduced January and February into the calendar, pushing March to the third position.

March is still the first month of the year for at least one billion people:

In most regions of India, the new year in the Hindu calendar starts on the New Moon before the Sun enters the zodiac sign of Aries (Meṣa)—on or around the day of the March equinox.

The Persian new year, Nowruz, is celebrated on March 21 around the world—from Iran and the Middle East to the Balkans, the Black Sea, and Central and South Asia.

The orthodox Jewish calendar starts the new year with the month of Nisan, which falls in March or April in the Gregorian calendar.



Both shamrocks and four-leaf clovers are associated with Saint Patrick's Day, and they're commonly confused as the same thing. A shamrock is a clover with three leaves, but the four-leaf clover is considered lucky. due to its rarity.



7 Surprising Facts About St. Patrick's Day

Who was the real St. Patrick? Was that legend about the snakes true? And why did so many St. Patrick's Day traditions start in America?

While St. Patrick's Day is now associated with wearing green, parades (when they're not canceled) and beer, the holiday is grounded in history that dates back more than 1,500 years. The earliest known celebrations were held in the 17th century on March 17, marking the anniversary of the death of St. Patrick in the 5th century. Learn more about the holiday's history and how it evolved into the event it is today.

1. The Real St. Patrick Was Born in Britain

Much of what is known about St. Patrick's life has been interwoven with folklore and legend. Historians generally believe that St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain (not Ireland) near the end of the 4th century. At age 16 he was kidnapped by Irish raiders and sold as a slave to a Celtic priest in the area now known as Northern Ireland. After toiling for six years as a shepherd, he escaped back to Britain. He eventually returned to Ireland as a Christian missionary.

2. There Were No Snakes Around for St. Patrick to Banish from Ireland

Among the legends associated with St. Patrick is that he stood atop an Irish hillside and banished snakes from Ireland—prompting all serpents to slither away into the sea. In fact, research suggests snakes never occupied the Emerald Isle in the first place. There are no signs of snakes in the country's fossil record. And water has surrounded Ireland since the last glacial period. Before that, the region was covered in ice and would have been too cold for the reptiles.

3. Leprechauns Are Likely Based on Celtic Fairies

The red-haired, green-clothed Leprechaun is commonly associated with St. Patrick's Day. The original Irish name for these figures of folklore is "lobaircin," meaning "small-bodied fellow." Belief in leprechauns likely stems from Celtic belief in fairies—tiny men and women who could use their magical powers to serve good or evil. In Celtic folktales, leprechauns were cranky souls, responsible for mending the shoes of the other fairies.

4. The Shamrock Was Considered a Sacred Plant

The shamrock, a three-leaf clover, has been associated with Ireland for centuries. It was called the “seamroy” by the Celts and was considered a sacred plant that symbolized the arrival of spring. According to legend, St. Patrick used the plant as a visual guide when explaining the Holy Trinity. By the 17th century, the shamrock had become a symbol of emerging Irish nationalism.

5. The First St. Patrick's Day Parade Was Held in America

While people in Ireland had celebrated St. Patrick since the 1600s, the tradition of a St. Patrick's Day parade began in America and actually predates the founding of the United States.

Records show that a St. Patrick's Day parade was held on March 17, 1601, in a Spanish colony in what is now St. Augustine, Florida. The parade and a St. Patrick's Day celebration a year earlier were organized by the Spanish Colony's Irish vicar Ricardo Artur. More than a century later, homesick Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched in Boston in 1737 and in New York City on March 17. Enthusiasm for the St. Patrick's Day parades in New York City, Boston and other early American cities only grew from there. In 2020 and 2021, parades throughout the country, including in New York City and Boston, were canceled or postponed for the first time in decades due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 virus. They returned in 2022.

6. The Irish Were Once Scorned in America

While Irish Americans are now proud to showcase their heritage, the Irish were not always celebrated by fellow Americans. Beginning in 1845, a devastating potato blight caused widespread hunger throughout Ireland. While approximately 1 million perished, another 2 million abandoned their land in the largest-single population movement of the 19th century. Most of the exiles—nearly a quarter of the Irish nation—came to the shores of the United States. Once they arrived, the Irish refugees were looked down upon as disease-ridden, unskilled and a drain on welfare budgets.

7. Corned Beef and Cabbage Was an American Innovation

The meal that became a St. Patrick's Day staple across the country—corned beef and cabbage—was an American innovation. While ham and cabbage were eaten in Ireland, corned beef offered a cheaper substitute for impoverished immigrants. Irish Americans living in the slums of lower Manhattan in the late 19th century and early 20th purchased leftover corned beef from ships returning from the tea trade in China. The Irish would boil the beef three times—the last time with cabbage—to remove some of the brine.

Sunshine Protection

The **Sunshine Protection Act** is a proposed United States federal law that would make U.S. daylight saving time permanent, meaning the time would no longer change twice per year. The bill has been proposed during several sessions of Congress. In 2022, the Senate passed the bill by unanimous consent, although several senators stated later that they would have objected if they had known that the bill could pass. No iteration of the bill has passed the House.

Background

Time zones were first introduced in the United States in 1883 by railroad companies. In 1918, they were codified into federal law by the Standard Time Act, which also included a provision for nationwide daylight saving time modeled after European laws designed to save energy during World War I, but that component was repealed a year later due to protests by farmers.^[3] Many states subsequently introduced daylight saving time, and in 1966, the Uniform Time Act standardized the dates when it begins and ends.^[3] Hawaii, most of Arizona, and the U.S. territories have opted to observe permanent standard time, but the Uniform Time Act forbids observation of permanent daylight saving time.

The Emergency Daylight Saving Time Energy Conservation Act enacted year round daylight saving time for a two-year experiment from January 6, 1974, to April 7, 1975, but Congress later ended the experiment early on October 27, 1974, and did not make it permanent^[5] due to unfavorable public opinion, especially regarding concerns about children walking to school and waiting for school buses on dark winter mornings.

In the late 2010s, resolutions were passed in more than 30 states advocating for the federal government to abolish the annual transitions.

4 Things Older Adults Need to Know About RSV as Cases Surge

Little ones aren't the only ones in danger from this common respiratory virus

It's often thought of as a risk to young kids, but respiratory syncytial virus (or RSV for short) can be downright dangerous for older adults too.

More than 177,000 older Americans wind up in the hospital each year because of RSV — well within the range of the flu's annual impact — and roughly 14,000 die from it. And right now, cases of RSV are surging in many areas of the country. Data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) show that nationwide infection rates have skyrocketed in the past few weeks, and older adults are being hospitalized at higher rates than previous years.

That is bad news ahead of what many experts say could be a stormy season for flu and COVID-19. All three illnesses — RSV, influenza, and COVID-19 — share a similar list of symptoms. And all three cause complications in adults with certain chronic health conditions and in those who are 65 and older.

"I think RSV is a virus that's been a little bit under the radar screen, but it's responsible for a significant number of infections," says Marshall Glesby, M.D., associate chief of the Division of Infectious Diseases at Weill Cornell Medicine in New York. "So, it is something to be aware of."

Here's what you need to know about RSV, including how to help prevent an infection and how to spot warning signs if you do get sick.

1. Symptoms are hard to separate from other common illnesses

What makes the increase of RSV cases so tricky, especially this time of year and given the pandemic, is that many of its common symptoms overlap with those of the common cold, flu and COVID-19.

A cough, a fever and a runny nose often accompany an RSV infection, the CDC says. Same with wheezing, sneezing and a decrease in appetite. You may even notice a "pinkeye-type of manifestation" or sinus-like issues, Glesby adds. It's typical for these symptoms to appear in stages, not all at once.

Most adults who get RSV will experience a mild course of these ailments. But in some adults — especially older adults who have weaker immune systems — the illness can turn serious and lead to pneumonia or congestive heart failure. People with asthma and chronic lung disease may also suffer with more severe symptoms that make it difficult to breathe.

2. Shortness of breath is a warning sign you need medical attention

If you find yourself battling a bad case of RSV, you may need to be hospitalized.

Shortness of breath is one warning sign that you should seek immediate medical attention. "If you find yourself having coughing spasms or fits where it's hard to catch your breath, that's not normal," says Patricia A. Stinchfield, a pediatric nurse practitioner and president of the National

Foundation for Infectious Diseases (NFID). The same goes if you get out of breath while doing routine chores.

"That means that your lungs and your heart and your circulatory system are sort of overworking," Stinchfield says. (Likewise, struggling to catch a breath or taking short and shallow, rapid breaths are red flags for severe RSV in babies.)

You should check in with a doctor if you have significant weakness or your symptoms get worse and won't go away, Glesby says.

ARE YOU AT HIGH RISK?

Adults at highest risk for severe RSV infection include:

- Older adults, especially those 65 and older
- Adults with chronic heart or lung disease
- Adults with weakened immune systems

"The main thing for older adults and parents of young children is to listen to your gut. If your gut is saying, 'I don't think this is normal, and I'm scared,' that's when it's time to call [the doctor]," Stinchfield says.

An NFID report found that although adults with RSV and influenza report similar symptoms, RSV patients do not seek medical attention as quickly as flu patients.

3. There is no specific treatment for RSV

Unlike with the flu or COVID-19, there isn't an antiviral treatment available for the majority of adults that can knock out RSV, nor is there a vaccine that can help prevent it, though researchers are working to develop both.

There also isn't an easy at-home test that can tell you if your illness is due to RSV. If you go to your doctor's office with symptoms, they'll probably test you for multiple viruses to rule out different treatment options.

If you're positive for RSV, over-the-counter pain relievers can help to manage fevers and general discomfort. Fluids can help keep you hydrated and your immune system functioning at its best, Stinchfield says. If you need to be hospitalized, you may receive oxygen support and fluids through an IV.

4. RSV is very contagious.

You can catch RSV just like you might catch the flu and other respiratory bugs. Virus droplets can fly through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes and land in your eyes, nose or mouth. RSV can survive for several hours on hard surfaces, the CDC says, so be sure to wipe down high-touch areas (think doorknobs, light switches and TV remotes) if you or someone you live with is sick.

You can also get RSV from direct contact with the virus, say by kissing an infected grandchild on the face. Once you have it, you are usually contagious "for quite a while," Stinchfield says — up to eight days. Some infants and people with weakened immune systems can spread the virus for as long as four weeks, according to the CDC.

To that point, if you have a grandchild or another little one you plan to be around who is battling a runny nose and cough, it's best to wait until symptoms subside before visiting, Stinchfield says.

As RSV rages, it's important to wash your hands often (and correctly, which means with soap and water for 20 seconds), wipe down frequently touched surfaces and avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth — all familiar precautions from the coronavirus pandemic, Glesby says. Finally, if you can, stay home when you are sick.

What Adults Need to Know About the New RSV Vaccines

June 9, 2023 – After nearly 60 years of effort, vaccine protection against the potentially lethal respiratory infection respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV, is finally a reality.

The FDA approved two new RSV vaccines: GSK's Arexvy on May 3, and Pfizer's Abrysvo on May 31. Both approvals are for adults ages 60 and above, who are among the most vulnerable to the infection.

If the CDC recommends the vaccines – a decision that's expected after its Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices meets June 21 and gives its recommendation – both vaccines could be available by fall, ahead of the RSV season.

The new vaccines are “a wonderful advance,” said William Schaffner, MD, an infectious disease specialist at Vanderbilt University Medical Center in Nashville, and medical director of the National Foundation for Infectious Diseases.

Yet he and other experts wonder if Americans have so much “vaccine fatigue” that they will pass up the shot – especially since it is expected to be offered at the same time as the annual influenza vaccine and an updated COVID-19 booster.

Awareness about the disease itself is another issue that may thwart the vaccine effort, as even some doctors mistakenly think of RSV as solely a pediatric danger, other experts said.

RSV Danger for Older Adults, Children

RSV is a contagious virus, spread via virus droplets, direct contact with the virus, or touching a surface with the virus on it, causing lower respiratory infections. It can occur in all age groups but can be especially dangerous in older adults and children younger than 5. Symptoms may include a runny nose, coughing, sneezing, a decreased appetite, a fever, and wheezing.

The virus circulates seasonally, usually beginning in the fall and peaking in winter.

Often, the infection is mild and clears up, but it can turn serious, leading to more severe infections such as pneumonia.

Effectiveness

The FDA's approval of Arexvy, the vaccine from GSK (formerly GlaxoSmithKline), is based on clinical trial research studying a single dose given to people ages 60 and older. In the main phase III clinical trial, 12,500 people received Arexvy and 12,500 received a placebo.

The vaccine reduced the risk of getting RSV-associated lower respiratory tract disease by 82.6% and the risk of having a severe disease by 94.1%.

Leonard Friedland, MD, GSK's vice president and director of scientific affairs and public health, vaccines, termed those results "exceptional" in an emailed response to questions.

Side effects reported by some patients most commonly involved pain where they got the shot, fatigue, muscle pain, a headache, and joint pain or stiffness. Atrial fibrillation, an abnormal heart rhythm, was reported in 10 people who got the vaccine and four who received the placebo.

Two other studies evaluated about 2,500 people receiving the vaccine. In a group receiving the RSV vaccine with an influenza vaccine, two people had a kind of inflammation affecting the brain and spinal cord, acute disseminated encephalomyelitis (ADEM). One died.

In another study, one person developed Guillain-Barre syndrome, a disorder that occurs when the immune system damages nerve cells, leading to muscle weakness and sometimes paralysis. The FDA is requiring the company to do a post-marketing study to investigate further the risks for Guillain-Barre syndrome and ADEM. GSK said it will also assess atrial fibrillation risks in a post-marketing study, voluntarily.

The FDA approved Pfizer's Abrysvo based on the results of an ongoing clinical trial in which about 17,000 people got the vaccine and another 17,000 got a placebo, analyzing data from the first RSV season of the study.

The vaccine reduced the risk of RSV-related lower respiratory tract disease with two or more symptoms by 66.7% and three or more symptoms by 85.7%. It was 62% effective against RSV-associated acute respiratory illness, which can lead to hospitalization.
